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Section 1 - Introduction

Welcome!

On behalf of the entire camp staff, administration, we want to extend a warm welcome to all new campers and your families! We are grateful and honored to have the opportunity to be in this valuable educational partnership with you.

Camp Drift-A-Bit is a summer day camp which will blend fun, challenging, and interpersonally developmental programming in a nature-based educational setting. Campers will be constantly engaged in outdoor activities programmed to culminate in valuable, long-lasting experiences. Our constantly monitored environment, with specially-trained counselors, is carefully designed.

1.1 Camp Drift-A-Bit Vision and Values

MISSION

It is the mission of Camp Drift-A-Bit to empower young Southern West Virginians to explore and care for their natural environment through outdoor adventure, community service, and environmental stewardship. We encourage children to embrace their natural curiosity to inspire confidence in their ability to learn.

We create opportunities for children to become:

Curious by looking deeply at natural wonders, both big and small, that surround us each day in our own backyard.

Courageous by empowering each child to challenge their perceived comfort zone, through adventure and activities facilitated in an emotionally and physically safe environment.

Confident by practicing skills to become effective team players and leaders.

VISION

Camp Drift-A-Bit will facilitate an appreciation for outdoor adventure by integrating experiential education concepts into cooperative activities. These experiences will build a foundation for a lifetime of memories and interpersonal development.

Camp Drift-A-Bit aims to give each child the opportunity to develop critical age-appropriate skills in an outdoor setting. Specifically, our vision focuses on: teamwork, leadership, trust, critical thinking, and emotional intelligence.

Our outdoor education is based upon the concept of immediate consequence and results for campers' decisions. For example, when rock climbing, the ability to manage stress and trust your counselor will

give immediate, clear, easily understood results; during a field initiative, if a camper chooses to break a rule, the entire group may not succeed at the challenge given. These are all learning opportunities for each camper. Through group processing, we strive to encourage each child's natural desire to learn, pulling valuable lessons from the group experiences and engendering progress on our **CORE VALUES**:

- Teamwork, trust, and leadership lead to success
- Support a spirit of service mindedness and respect for the environment
- Encourage the appreciation of diversity, compassion, and advocacy
- Equally value physical and emotional safety
- Safety comes first at all times

1.2 How we are organized

Camp Drift-A Bit is a summer camp which facilitates activities in a variety of outdoor settings. Camp staff includes Camp Director, Staff Trainer, Senior and Junior camp counselors, guides, and volunteers.

Camp Management:

- Camp Director: Responsible for hiring and firing of camp staff, as well as all coordination and organization of all facets of camp operation, communication with families, financial matters, etc. Reports directly to NRGLC Executive Board.
- Staff Trainer: Responsible for training Senior and Junior Counselors in critical aspects of camp management, rules, operations, values, and best practices. Responsible for training Guides on camp specifics which will integrate their areas of expertise into campers' positive experiences. Reports directly to Camp Director.

Camp Operational Staff:

- Senior Counselor:
 - Reports directly to Camp Management
 - 21+ years of age
 - Certified in CPR and First Aid
 - Background checks required
 - Trained by Staff Trainer in critical and secondary areas of focus:
 - Critical areas of focus: physical and emotional safety management, facilitation skills, milieu management, medication disbursement, time management, group management, and Camp Drift-A-Bit best practices.
 - Secondary areas of focus: Associated physical skills such as belaying, mountain biking, etc. While a senior counselor is proficient in these skills, their focus is on monitoring the Junior Counselors on their application of these skills as well as monitoring the group for physical and emotional safety.
- Junior Counselor:
 - Reports directly to Senior Counselor
 - 12 - 20 years of age for Outdoor Explore; 15 - 20 years of age for High Adventure
 - Certified in CPR, First Aid

- Background checks required for non-minors
- Trained by Trained by Staff Trainer in critical and secondary areas of focus:
 - Critical areas include physical skills such as belaying, mountain biking, etc; physical and emotional safety management, group management.
 - Secondary skills involve supporting Senior Counselor in any way directly instructed, as well as developing a growing understanding of the diverse and ever-changing aspects of group dynamics involved in daily camp activities.
- Guide:
 - Trained employees of partner organizations
 - Will meet standards of partner organization to safely guide the activity being facilitated
- Volunteers:
 - No specific training required
 - Background checks required
 - Expected to be present when scheduled, and may help in various ways depending on interest and ability as seen fit by Camp Management

Section 2 - Registration, Financial Responsibilities

2.1 Selecting a Camp Session

Wondering if your camper should register for the High Adventure or Outdoor Experiential Education camp program? Read the requirements and descriptions below to help determine which program is right for your camper. If you're still not sure, feel free to contact our Camp Director.

About

Camp Drift-A-Bit's High Adventure program guides campers on an exciting sampler course of all the adrenaline-boosting, confidence-building activities the New River Gorge area has to provide. Learn to rock climb, mountain bike, and stand-up paddle board and more. Campers will practice leadership and team building skills on high ropes courses and challenging cooperative games. Because Camp Drift-A-Bit believes environmental stewardship goes hand-in-hand with outdoor adventure, campers will also have the opportunity to assess and care for their environment through a community service project and multiple hands-on environmental science experiments!

For campers who just can't get enough of the great outdoors, we offer the option to stay one night on site for a campout on Camp Drift-A-Bit property. Campers will learn how to pitch a tent, build a campfire, cook outdoors and sleep under the stars. This optional campout also a great bonding opportunity to wrap up a week of team building adventures.

Campers do not need prior experience in the activities planned for the week. However, it will ease your camper's experience if they are comfortable in/around water and are able to ride a

bike. This will also be a physically demanding week. While there will be plenty of breaks, this program requires physical activity each day, rain or shine.

About

Camp Drift-A-Bit's Outdoor Explore program guides campers through an exploration of the natural world around them. Campers will learn practical outdoor skills like plant I.D., shelter building, and compass navigation. Each day, campers will be introduced to elements of physics, biology, geography and more through hands-on experiments and team building activities.

And because Camp Drift-A-Bit believes outdoor adventure goes hand-in-hand with environmental stewardship, campers will also have the opportunity to assess and care for their environment through a community service project.

This program is less physically demanding than the High Adventure program. While campers will be outside engaging in activities rain or shine, there will be more time for breaks and physical components consist only of hiking, running and balancing activities.

2.1.3 Campers with Unique Physical, Mental or Behavioral Abilities or Conditions

We are a small camp with limited resources. From time to time, we encounter children who have needs greater than we can provide for. If your camper has had a documented behavior problem or they are or seem to be unable to function fully in their current setting, you must disclose this to us so we can discuss how best to support your child's success at Camp Drift-A Bit.

If your camper has unique physical abilities or conditions that may hinder their participation in any camp activity, please let us know. We will accommodate campers of different abilities *only if and as we are able to*, but we must have significant notice and information to consider such potential accommodations.

All children deserve to be fully supported no matter what their individual needs are. We will always do our best to support each child within the bounds of our capacities. However, we are currently unable to provide consistent one-on-one attention to any given child.

Campers will be split into smaller groups for the week according to Camp best practices, which will take into account social, family, gender, and age factors.

2.2 Registration Procedure

Camp Drift-A Bit has open registration from April 8, 2019 to June 7, 2019 for Session 1 camps; and open enrollment from April 8, 2019 to June 28, 2019 for Session 2 camps. In order to register your child or to be put on the waiting list (if applicable), the following steps must be complete by the registration closing date:

- Pay Camp Tuition in full via check or credit card. Please see the Registration Packet for payment instructions.

2.3 Financial Responsibilities

2.3.1 Camp Tuition Payment

A non-refundable registration deposit must be made via our online registration page, which may be found at nrglc.org/camp-registration. This deposit will only hold a space for your camper, allowing you time to complete and return the registration packet and make the full camp tuition payment.

Please note, **your camper's space will not be fully secured until the completed registration packet and full camp tuition payment have been received by Camp Drift-A-Bit.** Spaces will be secured on a first come, first serve basis. For this reason, we encourage you to complete and return the registration packet along with camp tuition promptly after paying the deposit on the online registration page.

You will receive email notification when your camp payment and registration packet have been received. Only at this time should you assume your camper's space has been fully secured.

2.3.2 Late Payments

Camp tuition not paid in full by the deadline will be considered a cancellation of camp participation and will void any enrollment position saved for that camper. Families who wish to enroll a camper

despite late or unpaid tuition must contact Camp Management directly using the information at the end of this packet.

Registration closing date for both Session 1 camps is **June 7, 2019**.

Registration closing date for both Session 2 camps is **June 28, 2019**.

2.3.3 Tuition Refund Policy

No tuition refunds are available unless in case of extenuating circumstances, and only then at the sole discretion of Camp Management.

Section 3 - Camp Drift-A Bit Calendar, Hours of Operation, Daily Arrival and Dismissal

3.1 Camp Drift-A Bit Calendar

3.2 Hours of Operation

Camp begins at 9:00 am and ends at 4:00pm, Monday through Friday.

There will be an optional overnight stay Thursday of each High Adventure session.

Regular drop off is between 8:30am - 9:00am each morning.

Regular pick up is up between 4:00pm - 4:30pm each evening.

3.2.1 Morning and Evening Camp Care

Camp Drift-A-Bit offers morning and evening camp care for families who cannot make the regular drop off/pick up period. If you know your camper(s) will need morning or evening camp care, you may select these options in the registration packet. You are also welcome to register as needed should your schedule change at any point, even during the week of camp.

Morning Camp Care is from 7:30am - 8:30am

Evening Camp Care is from 4:30pm - 5:30pm

One session of camp care is \$25. For example, if your child only needs morning camp care for one day, but needs evening camp care for two days of camp, your total will be \$75.

Camp Drift-A-Bit cannot be responsible for campers dropped off or picked up outside of the designated times above. Under no circumstances are campers to be dropped off or picked up outside of these designated times. If you are unable to have your camper picked up at the scheduled time, please contact the Camp Director immediately.

3.2.2 General Camp Schedule

The following is a **general daily schedule**. After registration has closed, all confirmed campers will receive a Welcome Letter. Please refer to your Welcome Letter or contact the Camp Director for a more specific schedule.

7:30 am - 8:30 am Morning Camp Care (optional; \$25/day)

8:30 am - 9:00 am Drop off: campers join in field games. **Camp begins at 9:00 am sharp**

9:00 am - 10:00 am Campers participate in their small group activities. This could include cooperative games, environmental science experiments or outdoor exploration activities.

10:00 - 2:00 pm Scheduled programming. For High Adventurers this includes activities such as mountain biking or climbing. For Outdoor Explorers, this includes experiential classes, and outdoor exploration. Programming may include travel to various locations, which may not have cellular service. Families who need to reach their campers during this time should only do so in case of emergency, and may do so by contacting the Camp Management. Please see the Contact Information section of this handbook.

2:00 pm - 3:00 pm - Campers return to Camp Drift-A-Bit to participate in small group debriefs and activities

3:00 pm - 4:00 pm Large group debrief, discuss expectations for the following day, and play field games

4:00 pm - 4:30 pm Camp Drift-A Bit dismissed. **Please be on time to pick up your camper.**

4:30 pm - 5:30 pm Evening Camp Care (optional; \$25/day)

3.3 Arrival

To help develop the camper's sense of being capable, we encourage you to drop your child off without joining us in the field for field games. Counselors, staff and volunteers will be available to provide any support that is necessary to gently ease this transition. If you have specific concerns with this policy, please contact the Camp Director.

If your camper is late, it is your responsibility to make arrangements with Camp Management, and no guarantees are made that your camper will be able to join programming for that day. Please see the Late Arrival section of this handbook for more information.

3.4 Dismissal, Pick Up and After Camp Drift-A Bit

Please be on time to pick up your campers. If you are going to be late picking up your camper, it is your responsibility to notify the Camp Director so that arrangements can be made to supervise your camper. While Camp Drift-A-Bit is generally understanding of the occasional life occurrence that may cause a family to be late, repeatedly late pick-ups may be charged for evening camp care at the discretion of the Camp Director.

Our staff is not scheduled to supervise campers after the end of evening camp care, and we cannot guarantee that your camper may stay on camp property after the last staff member leaves.

If someone other than a parent is picking up your child, the person must be listed on the child's Authorized Pick Up list. If that person is not known by Camp Drift-A Bit staff/volunteers, I.D. will be required. Please notify the Center Director immediately if there are any changes to your child's Authorized Pick Up list. Please contact the Camp Director if someone not on the list needs to pick up your child on any given day.

Pick up is a good time to check your child's belongings for anything missing, or anything extra. Please ask a Camp Counselor if you need to check the Lost and Found.

While pick-up is also a great time to meet your camp counselors, conversations involving sensitive or involved communications should be made with the Camp Director.

3.5 Late Arrival, Early Pick up, Absences

No scheduling of late arrival, absences from camp, or early pickup are to be expected. Consistency of attendance and participation is crucial to camp atmosphere. In case of extenuating circumstances causing tardiness, absence or late pickup, please contact Camp Management directly.

Campers arriving late can cause serious disruptions to camp programming, and may be left behind for the day. This may seem harsh until you consider examples such as a mountain bike trip that must leave at 9:00 am sharp; it may be impossible to complete the activities planned if the group has a significant delay. If your camper is going to be late, it is your responsibility to make arrangements with Camp Management, and no guarantees are made that your camper will be able to join programming for that day.

3.6 Carpools

Many Camp Drift-A Bit families coordinate carpools. The names of all parents in your carpool must be listed on the Authorized Pick Ups list section of your child's enrollment form. If your child participates in a carpool on a regular basis, please ensure our staff is also aware so communication with the parents can be arranged, if needed. **If you would like assistance with joining or creating a carpool, please feel free to contact Camp Management - we'll be happy to help you coordinate!**

3.7 Inclement Weather

Please be sure your kids are prepared to be at Camp Drift-A Bit during all types of weather. **Unless conditions are dangerous, campers will be outside for a the duration of programming every day. Kids are not prevented from playing in the rain, mud, etc.** Campers should be prepared with multiple layers, rain gear, and outdoor-activity appropriate clothing.

Section 4 - Food, Clothing, and Personal Belongings

4.1 Food Policy

Camp Drift-A-Bit provides lunch daily for all camp sessions. For campers participating in the overnight during either High Adventure session, dinner will be provided the night of, and breakfast will be provided the morning after. Camp Drift-A-Bit works with local catering company, Gourmet on the Gorge, to provide healthy and kid-friendly meals.

Please provide the following items for your camper each day:

- Snacks
- Durable water bottle with a secure lid
- Appropriate food for any dietary requirements Camp Drift-A-Bit is not able to accomodate

4.1.2 Allergies and Special Considerations

It is the responsibility of all families to report any special dietary needs to Camp Management. If your child has food allergies or is unable to eat any foods, please include this information in your child's registration form. As a matter of normal routine, campers may bring any food they wish to camp, including (but not limited to) tree nuts, fruits, seafood, etc. Accommodations may be made as able for campers with food allergies or special dietary needs so long as sufficient notice is given. Camp Drift-A-Bit does not guarantee the ability to accomodate any or all dietary needs, and our counselors do not receive formal training in special dietary considerations. However, we will work with campers, parents and guardians to accommodate as we are able.

4.2 Clothing

Campers should be prepared to be outdoors daily in all but hazardous weather conditions. It's imperative for their safety and enjoyment that they have layers of comfortable, weather-appropriate activewear every day. We *suggest* the following packing list:

Please label all clothing, lunch boxes, water bottles and backpacks with your child's first and last name. While we will do our best to keep your campers' belongings on their person, Camp Drift-A-Bit is not responsible for any lost clothing or personal belongings.

Please **do not** send your camper in flip-flops. Closed-toed shoes are required for all non-water activities. All water shoes must have a heel strap, but do not need a closed-toe.

4.3 Personal Belongings

4.3.1 Toys and 'Focusing Tools', etc.

Please do not send any electronics of any kind, nor any toys, books, focusing tools, etc. with your camper. These items are not allowed and may distract campers from programming and interfere with the natural environment. This policy includes the optional overnight stay during High Adventure sessions. Your camper may be permitted to bring a musical instrument to the overnight portion of High Adventure sessions, **only if pre-approved by the Camp Director**. Camp Drift-A-Bit is not responsible for any items lost by campers.

4.3.2 Money, Credit Cards, etc.

Please do not send money of any form with your camper. At no time will your camper need or have the option to purchase any items or food during camp. Camp Drift-A-Bit is not responsible for money, or cards of any type lost by campers.

4.3.3 Lost and Found

Camp Drift-A-Bit will keep a Lost and Found box, which you may ask to check during pick up or drop off periods. At the end of each camp session, we will set all items out for retrieval and anything left unclaimed will either be kept for emergency use for future campers needed said item, or donated.

Section 5 - Camp Discipline & Dynamics

Camp Drift-A Bit is an experiential learning program of NRGLC. As such, physical and emotional safety of each camper is paramount and treated as equally important. Campers are introduced to the critical concepts of inclusive, kind, group-oriented behavior on day one of camp, and receive consistent reminders regarding expectations throughout each day. Camp Drift-A-Bit takes proactive measures to create physically and emotionally safe and inclusive environments by sharing and enforcing the principles of our Full Value Contract, Challenge by Choice, and Positive Discipline, each described in the following sections.

5.1 Full Value Contract

Every small group at camp begins the week by opting in to our version of the Full Value Contract. The Full Value contract means to set expectations for the week in regards to how we will treat each other and create an environment that will allow us to have the most rewarding camp experience. Our Full Value Contract is made up of the following elements:

Physical & Emotional Safety - We explore the meanings of each, share examples, and determine how we can ensure both during our time together.

Challenge by Choice and Impel to Challenge - These concepts help us set team and individual goals for the week, while empowering each camper to set and respect boundaries. See the section below for a deeper description.

Communication - We learn the difference between group needs and individual needs. We then explore examples of when one need may be more important than the other. We review what respectful communication sounds like, and when we think communication might be difficult (during challenging team-building activities, for example).

The Platinum Rule - This is our preferred take on the more common Golden Rule. The Platinum Rule states: Treat others as *they* want to be treated. We discuss why this is important

Finally, we promise to uphold the values explored and agreed upon here. Each small group develops their own “contract” through words or symbols relevant and understandable for all group members (e.g. signed a group t-shirt, made a handshake, etc.) This is their touchstone throughout the week to encourage thoughtful and caring group dynamics.

5.1.1 Challenge by Choice & Impel to Challenge

Challenge by Choice (CbC) is the principle that each camper is invited to participate *voluntarily* in each activity during camp. A camper may choose to opt out, or participate to a lesser degree. That choice is to be respected by counselors and campers alike. However, overcoming fear by challenging comfort zones is an essential, rewarding, and empowering element of experiential education. Therefore, counselors may respectfully encourage each camper to *try* each activity to some degree before opting out

completely. We call this encouragement Impel to Challenge. CbC empowers campers to build an internal locus of control wherein each camper may:

- practice respecting their own and other's terms of consent and participation
- challenge their perceived comfort zone
- practice self-advocacy
- set their own goals and definition of success

5.2 Positive Discipline & Experiential Education

Camp Drift-A-Bit is a positive discipline experiential learning program, meaning we are non-punitive and we have zero tolerance for shame, blame, pain, or humiliation. Positive discipline emphasizes mutual respect between adults and children (and amongst children themselves). It follows recent research showing good discipline is dependent on children feeling a strong connection to their community and family.

That said, experiential education is based on the concept that actions have consequences. The advantage experiential education has over traditional classroom methodology is immediacy of consequence in relation to actions or choices. When a camper is able to listen to and apply skills being taught by staff, they will see immediate results. Even better, when a camper participates with the group and includes themselves and others equally, they will feel included, successful, and important, and will immediately experience those rewards.

Counselors are well-trained in educational and behavior-modification approaches which empower campers to make correct choices in an environment of inclusiveness and support. Campers will learn they have the ability to greatly influence their own experience at camp in a variety of important ways. **We believe campers learn best from those with whom they are in caring, mutually respectful relationships that promote independence.**

At Camp Drift-A Bit, every staff member...

- Understands that quality of relationships and camp climate are absolutely critical to successful experiential learning.
- Implements principles of mutual respect, encouragement, belonging and significance.
- Focuses on positive-outcome solutions to misbehavior.
- Views mistakes as opportunities to learn and misbehavior as opportunities to practice critical life skills.
- Knows that a misbehaving child is a discouraged child.
- Knows that children do better when they feel better.
- Believes that all people are equal and every child deserves dignity and respect.

By focusing on prevention, and early, thoughtful intervention we are thorough, systematic and effective at preventing students from rising to higher levels of misbehavior. We work to prevent misbehavior by building positive emotional connections to Camp Drift-A Bit for every camper, engaging all campers in learning and practicing problem solving and empathy in matters of discipline.

Section 6 - Health and Wellbeing Policies

6.1 Illness & Accident Information

Information should be kept current with correct phone numbers and contact information for emergencies. Please let the Camp Director know immediately if there are any changes to your family's information.

Camp Drift-A Bit must excuse - and will send home - campers and staff if the any suspiciously contagious symptoms occur, including (but not limited to):

- Copious nasal discharge
- Persistent cough or heavy congestion
- Diarrhea (three or more watery stools or one bloody stool within 24 hours)
- Vomiting (two or more times within 24 hours)
- Open or oozing sores, unless properly covered with bandages
- Suspicion of communicable infections such as pink eye, impetigo, and scabies.
- Children may return 24 hours after the start of antibiotic treatment and abatement of fever without antipyretics
- Lice - Until first treatment is completed and no live lice are seen
- A fever of 100.5° Fahrenheit or higher and also one or more of the following:
 - Earache
 - Headache
 - Sore Throat
 - Rash
 - Fatigue that prevents regular activities

Please keep your child home from Camp Drift-A Bit if they show any of the symptoms above. Children may return to Camp Drift-A Bit 24 hours after all symptoms are gone.

Camp Drift-A-Bit follows the NRGLC Medical Policy. The full Medical Policy can be viewed online [here](#). Parents will be informed of any accidents or injuries that happen at Camp Drift-A Bit. If first aid was required, parents will be given a copy of the Accident/Medical Incident Report Form, with a summary of the incident, for your signature. The signed copy will be kept on file at Camp Drift-A Bit.

6.2 Child Abuse Reporting

Camp Drift-A Bit is required by law to immediately report any suspicious occurrences of physical, sexual, or emotional child abuse, child neglect, or child exploitation to Child Protective Services or local law enforcement.
